What is BTSF?





BTSF principles

- Not to replace initial training for inspectors
 - MS responsibility for initial training
- To complement initial training in areas where difficulties exist at EU level
 - ⇒ EU message / Mix of tutors team
- To favour knowledge sharing and networking to increase compatibility of control procedures throughout the EU
 - ⇒ Mix of tutors and participants
- To follow a train-the-trainer approach
 - ⇒ Dissemination is a key factor for BTSF success



BTSF objectives





- High levels of competence and awareness of EU rules amongst official control staff
- Harmonised approach to control systems
- High levels of consumer protection, animal health and welfare and plant health
- Promote the EU food system and build confidence with trade partners
- Enhance SPS regulatory cooperation with non-EU countries





Two main actors











BTSF: more than 10 years already

- Set up in 2005 on the basis of the OFFC Regulation
- Modest beginnings in 2006

NOW

- at the very heart of the DG SANTE mission
- a key player in SPS enforcement
- a solid capacity building programme in the EU and across the world



BTSF in figures from 2006 to 2016

A comprehensive programme

- More than 1500 events
- Around 61.000 participants
- Budget of approx. € 140 million

Approx. 33% of this activity covers non-EU countries





BTSF today

- A comprehensive programme
- Based on a traditional learning model with
 - (Regional) training workshops where tuition is provided by EU experts
 - Ad hoc assistance missions (STMs) where an EU expert is seconded to a specific country to solve a specific issue
 - = Face-to-face training courses



Cost-effectiveness study

Conclusions

- the current training model (key performance indicators and robust cost /benefit model) is cost-effective,
- SWOT analysis of different training strategies revealed that a blended training model will enable meeting the objectives of BTSF.
- Next steps: a BTSF Academy is being developed and will soon be launched



Towards a blended learning model

General features

- To continue with face-to face training (advanced courses, practical courses, trainers training, etc.)
- To diversify the training offer by including new technologies (elearning, tutorials, etc.)

Actions already developed or under development

- 10 E-learning modules now readily available for EU MS officials
- Video recording of the most interesting sessions during face-toface training



BTSF main challenges for the future

- Better respond to demand
- Improve networking
- Better identify and target priorities
- Ensure greater participant homogeneity
- Improve training quality
- Increase dissemination



BTSF monitoring and supervision

- At the end of each training day/seminar
 - Participants (Satisfaction + Learning)
 - Commission observers
- Some months after each training seminar
 - Participants (Behaviour + Dissemination)
- At the end of each training programme
 - MS National Contact Points, Commission services
- Regular general assessment
 - 2009: first BTSF ex-post evaluation
 - 2013: second BTSF ex-post evaluation





BTSF tomorrow

- BTSF has the potential to continue to provide knowledge and expertise which contributes to increasing consumer protection and fostering trade within and outside the EU,
- Stronger collaboration with competent authorities is desirable for identifying needs, ensuring quality, impact and dissemination,
- Moving to a more blended learning model is the only way to respond to the huge training demand and improve participant homogeneity.



Towards a closer coordination

Actions already developed or under development

- Ad-hoc assistance missions
- New BTSF cycle with regular consultation on needs
- Creation of a common platform for an easy and regular communication of MS training plans and priorities

Proposed improvements

- Co-financed and co-organised training with MS
- Creating a database of highly qualified MS tutors





Reinforcing dissemination efforts

- Better selection of participants (e.g. involvement of national trainers)
- Systematic mandatory information sharing process upon return
- Possible development of dissemination plans

= key factors in training success

Plant Protection Products

General features (1,270,000€)

- 8 courses of which 2 two-day trainings on field a(i) and (ii), 2 four-day trainings on field b(i) and (ii)
- In two cycles of 4 workshops with a total of 240 participants (30 per course), one cycle in the first year

Objectives

- > a: To focus on the assessment of efficacy of PPP (i) and on toxicological risk assessment (ii)
- ➤ b: To train on eco-toxicological RA for terrestrial and aquatic environment (i) and on environmental fate and behaviour in soil, air and water (ii)

Target

Staff of competent authorities of EU MS countries, CC, potential CC, EFTA and EEA



Food Improvement Agents

General features (2,480,000€)

- > 14 four-day courses (10 course A, 4 course B)
- > 420 supported participants in total (30 participants per course)

Objectives

- ➤ A: To train control staff on harmonised implementation and enforcement of EU law on food improvement agents,
- B: To train on planning of monitoring and official controls of food improvement agents

Target

- Course A: Staff of competent authorities of EU MS countries, CC, potential CC, EFTA and EEA, and ENP
- Course B: Staff of competent authorities of EU MS countries, CC, FFTA and FFA.

Transmissible Spongiform Encephalopathies and Animal by-products

General features (1,500,000€)

- > 8 three-day courses
- > 320 supported participants in total (40 participants per course)

Objectives

- Advanced course
- ➤ To promote a common understanding and deep knowledge of certain EU ABP and TSE rules among officials
- > To further harmonise approaches and practices of EU MS

Target

➤ Staff of competent authorities of EU MS countries, CC, potential CC, EFTA and EEA, and ENP, involved in planning and designing of control activities and field inspectors

Sustainable use of pesticides, with a focus on Integrated Pest Management

General features (2,100,000€)

- > 14 three-day courses
- 420 supported participants in total (30 participants per course)

Objectives

- > Theoretical and practical training
- ➤ Legal requirements, IPM general principles and crops specific schemes, IPM assessment at farm level

Target

- Staff of competent authorities of EU MS countries, CC, EFTA and EEA
- ➤ Northern and Central zone: 3 field crops, two greenhouse production, two field vegetable and fruit tree production
- Southern zone: 3 field vegetable production, 2 fruit tree, 1 greenhouse production and 1 field crops



Principles and methods of food safety risk analysis General features (1,660,000€)

- > 8 three-day courses
- > 300 supported participants in total (35-38 participants per course)

Objectives

- ➤ To develop cooperation activities on risk analysis at international level,
- ➤ To demonstrate the robustness of the EU system and ensure convergence of approaches between EU and beneficiaries,
- To internationally promote the EU approach to RA.

Target

- Staff of competent authorities of non-EU countries
- Preferably from public institutions involved in food safety risk analysis at central level



Antimicrobial resistance

General features (2,220,000€)

- > 11 three-day courses
- > 335 supported participants in total (around 30-31 per course)

Objectives

- > To develop cooperation activities on AMR at international level
- To internationally promote EU policies on AMR, and particularly the 'One-Health' approach
- To ensure the convergence of AMR policies between the EU and the beneficiary countries.

Target

officials from Competent Authorities in the beneficiary non-EU countries involved in developing, planning and coordinating control activities (preferably at central level) to tackle AMR



OLD Antimicrobial resistance

General features

- > 12 three-day courses
- 420 supported participants in total (around 35 par courses)

Objectives

- > To develop cooperation activities on AMR at international level
- To internationally promote EU policies on AMR, and particularly the 'One-Health' approach
- To ensure the convergence of AMR policies between the EU and the beneficiary countries.

Target

➤ officials from Competent Authorities in the beneficiary countries involved in developing, planning and coordinating control activities (preferably at central level) to tackle AMR
